A Tribute and thank you to Rob Nicholson

Ellesborough Trust, formerly known as Ellesborough Relief in Need Charity, held it's first meeting in April 1985 with Mr GW Line in the Chair and the following as Trustees:

Miss J Couper Mrs D Ellis The Reverend Harner Mr R Nicholson Mrs Tollinton

It was at this first meeting that Rob Nicholson drew attention to the need to keep in touch with teachers, doctors and the caring services for the benefit of the Parish. At the September meeting Rob Nicholson also alerted the Charity to a scheme that operated in certain areas to help the elderly, involving the provision of alarm devices which were worn around the neck. It is amazing that Rob introduced this service back in 1985, and that it is something that is still being provided by the Trust today.

The basis of the Charity was to look after those in need in the Parish.

Rob took over as Chair in 1988 and the charity continued to provide support to so many Parishioners, be it providing logs, installing telephones, helping with electricity supplies and often paying those bills, and even supporting a medical student on an overseas elective placement. Rob was always interested in hearing what our Parishioners had to say and he had a strong social conscience getting into talks with the National Trust for the Scrub Woods and many others organisations. As an example, he was instrumental in ensuring the

hornbeams at the edge of Scrubs Wood and Coombe Hill Car Park were cut back appropriately.

For 38 years Rob Chaired the Charity and was the right person to do so with his love of people and the Parish. He researched and identified those in need, visiting individuals and ensuring that they were offered support as necessary.

The current Trustees, and I, cannot thank Rob enough for the years of service that he gave to the Charity and to the Parish of Ellesborough. I can only hope that I, personally, will be able to do a fraction of what he achieved but I will strive to follow in his footsteps. Thank you, Rob!

Affordable Housing in Butlers Cross – Latest Position

Here is an update on the status which is currently awaiting approval by the Buckinghamshire Service Director.

Rural Exception sites seek to address the needs of the local community by providing Affordable Housing and accommodating households, at discounted prices, who are either current residents or have an existing family or employment connection within the Village.

The recent Housing Need Survey conducted in July 2021 potentially identified 20 households requiring affordable housing, as outlined below.

TENURE	NUMBER OF HOUSEHOLDS	SIZE OF HOME REQUIRED
Housing Association rented	7	5 X 1-BED
accommodation.		1 X 3-BED
		1 X 4-BED
Shared ownership.	13	1 X 1-BED
		12 X 2-BED

Within the above, 2 households required ground floor accommodation, due to limited mobility.

Hastoe (the developer) are providing 6 two storey semidetached dwellings, each 2 bedrooms. 2 will be shared ownership and 4 rented.

Based on requirements:

- No single bed units are being provided currently.
- No ground floor bed accommodation.
- Not a single household wanting rented accommodation is provided for, contrary to there being no requirement for 2-bedroom units, 4 are currently being planned.
- Majority wanted shared ownership, yet majority are rented.

Currently the draft S106 agreement on the planning website does not allow any single person or couple without children to occupy these properties as they are all 2 bedrooms; the Bucks Home Choice allocations policy forbids this. Additionally, if no one within the Parish or surrounding Parishes can meet the policies the housing will be open to the whole of Buckinghamshire in perpetuity.

The latest information from the Buckinghamshire Service Director, Planning & Environment, has stated in an email dated 8th April 2024 – "As you will be aware, interested parties have raised several questions relating to the needs survey submitted as part of the planning application and the subsequently published draft S106 agreement. Planning officers have therefore met with colleagues from Housing, who have been asked to review again the housing needs assessment in the light of the various questions raised.

Please be assured that this matter is proactively being progressed, as we are fully aware of the sensitivities involved."

There are currently in the latest approved development plan for South Aylesbury/Princes Risborough and Halton, a total of 1,794 new Affordable Housing Units planned to be built on brownfield and greenfield sites by 2033, within a 5-mile area.

Affordable Housing Schemes provide great opportunities for low-income people, but they need to meet the Parish requirements, the Village Design Statement and be in the correct location. When schemes like this are being implemented fail to meet these basic requirements, its splits our cherished Village.

If or when this scheme is approved, it will be interesting to see how many existing residents/relatives will occupy them.



Free exercise class

Did you know there is a free exercise class running in the village twice a week?

So, if you want some light exercise, would like to exercise your brain at the same time, do it in the company of like-minded people, enjoy making a noise and you'd like to learn and preserve an ancient craft - have you considered taking up bellringing?

The ringing of bells associated with Christian worship probably reached Britain in the 8th century and as churches acquired more bells, different combinations would be rung to signal the different services. On joyous occasions such as weddings several bells may have been rung together and rung higher to make a louder sound. For this secular ringing, local men would be paid to assist and so ringing came to be seen as a sport. People also rang for their own pleasure, and they would pay the sexton to open the tower to allow them to ring the bells. This pleasure ringing must have become prolific as the ringing of bells for pleasure was specifically restricted in a puritan act of parliament in 1643. John Bunyan rang bells in his youth but later joined a sect that condemned ringing as sinful. This hostility helped to keep what was a popular public activity separate from the worship of the church and it has remained so for a long time including up to the present day.

Originally, the bells would have been swung by a simple lever, and if the bell was out of reach, a rope. But this only allowed the bell to be tolled or chimed with little or no control. However, developments over the years now have the bells hung in a frame with large wheels attached to them and ropes dropping down to the area from which the bells are rung. Pulling the rope takes the bell from the position with the mouth vertically upwards, a full circle until the bell is vertical again. This is known as "full circle ringing" as opposed to when the bell is just rocked back and forth chiming. Strangely, full circle bellringing is a peculiarly English pastime with some 5680 sets of bells hung in this manner. Wales has 190, Scotland 19 and Ireland 35. The rest of the world has only just over 100 as most of their bells are hung purely for chiming. Ringing bells in the full circle method allows fine control of the bell's speed, and this in turn allows the sequence of the bells to be altered, albeit only in one place at a time and this is known as a "change". Change ringing probably began in the 1600s and the phrase "ringing the changes" first appeared in a sermon in 1614. It developed rapidly, mainly from London, with "methods" being written to describe the sequences of changes. Today there are many hundreds of methods, and for some it is the challenge of learning and ringing these methods that is the draw.

Ellesborough, has been fortunate for many years to have an enthusiastic team of ringers who enjoy ringing, whilst not being too serious about it. Our Tower Captain has over 50 years' experience of ringing and we have a qualified teacher, together with all the necessary equipment, including computer simulation, to train new bellringers. To maintain ringing in Ellesborough we need more ringers which is not limited by age or strength. Have You Done Your Roots?

8.00 pm – Tuesday 3rd

Good root growth is essential for healthy and productive plants. How can you be sure your plants are performing well under ground when you can't even see them? Andrew Mikolajski, writer and RHS judge, returns to answer this and other questions with his new talk.

STRAWBERRY RHUBARB PIE

Using Summer fruits, this classic pie combines fresh strawberries with rhubarb and a touch of orange zest, all baked in a traditional pie crust.

The pastry can be flaky, shortcrust, homemade or bought.

If the pie is still warm when you cut it, the juice maybe runny, so you can add a little thickener such as 2tsp diluted/blended arrowroot, cornflour or quick tapioca.

Ingredients

- 500g rhubarb stalks cut into 2cm pieces.
- 300g stemmed and sliced strawberries
- ¾ to 1 cup sugar
 (depending on how tart/sweet you like your pie)
- 1 finely grated orange zest
- 320g/12oz shortcrust or flaky pastry (homemade or bought)
- 1 large egg white, beaten



Method

- 1. Preheat the oven: 200°C Gas 6
- Assemble the pie filling: In a large bowl, gently combine the rhubarb and the strawberries with the sugar and orange zest. Let sit for 10 minutes. (You can add a little of the suggested diluted thickener if you wish).
- 3. Roll out one half of pastry dough and line the bottom of a pie dish with it. Transfer the filling into the crust and spread out evenly.
- 4. Roll out the second half of pastry dough and place over the pie. Trim and seal the top crust edges over the bottom crust edges and use your fingers or a fork to crimp and flute the top and bottom edges together. Cut slits in the top for the steam to escape.
- 5. If you want, for a nice glaze on your pie, use a pastry brush to brush a thin layer of egg the top of the pie.
- 6. Bake the pie: Place pie on the middle rack of the 200°C/Gas 6 oven with a baking sheet on a lower rack to catch any juices that might spill over.
- Bake for 20 minutes at 200°C/Gas 6, then reduce heat to 180°C/Gas 5 and bake an additional 40-50 minutes longer. The pie is done when the crust is nicely browned and the filling (that you can see through the venting holes) thick and bubbly.
- 8. Serve warm or cool.

Gardening in Ellesborough

We are moving into the busiest time of the year and taking stock after the winter months

I am writing this at the end of the wettest and chilliest of Aprils and at last it has stopped raining, at least for a while. Now with the growing strength of the sun, trees, shrubs and a whole galaxy of plants are almost within hours transformed into a breathtaking tapestry of fresh greens and a riot of colour.

Blue bells are out through the wilder areas and under the silver birches. The blue theme is carried through with the intense colours of the self-seeded forget-me-nots that contrast with the purple honesty. The wild cowslips are spreading even wider this year, down the lane and in the wild-flower meadow (and with an exceptional show in the churchyard).

The Head Gardener (HG) has been particularly pleased with her spectacular range of tulips which she has added to over the years. This year they have done exceptionally well; lighting up the gloomier grey days and lasted for weeks in the cooler weather, over lapping and following on from the early Spring daffodils. Fruit trees are blossoming, although with these volatile weather patterns, fears of frost are ever present until May is out. In France some vineyards have a mass of special candles lit under the vulnerable vine blossom to try and protect against sudden frost. We have never gone that far but there have been past times when we have gone out in the dark and draped fleece over fruit bushes having seen late weather warnings of plunging temperatures. Just goes to show what happens when gardening gets a real grip!

Getting on with work in the garden this season has been a depressing stop- start process. Hopes now rise for decent spells of drying workable soil. The gales and hail storms are a fading memory and the daily temperatures rise from single figures to the mid- teens and higher within a week. I am way behind with moving barrow loads of homemade compost and, yet so far, have not needed to import any. The value of compost on our poor chalk soil cannot be overstated, many years of laying thickly on the surface of borders have really paid off and virtually eliminated the need to dig, it helps to suppress weeds (unfortunately not ground elder) and looks good.

We are moving into the busiest time of the year and taking stock after the winter months we find old favourites need drastic pruning, some to move and some die off; it is also the time for the optimistic planting of the new. The HG is passionate about raising and caring for plants from propagation to maturity, the greenhouse at this time of the year is packed with tender



specimens to be planted out for the summer and with those destined for the annual Kimble and Ellesborough Horticultural Society (KEHS) sale.

The HG, like many keen gardeners, is a great giver and receiver of cuttings and seeds and recalls where the longer established and treasured plants came from. A walk round the garden can be a nostalgic reminder of family, friends, neighbours and visitors who gave which plant or shrub and when. Sometimes, though the plants live on, the donator has passed away. Most recently the gorgeous Black Iris and the many Hostas she was given by our friend Jim Alford who sadly recently died.

Our progress towards minimising labour in the garden has stalled rather; plans to grass over another border last autumn didn't happen, mainly due, as the HG makes very clear, to my frequent changes of mind. However, it is not just a matter of digging over and levelling, there are so many plants the HG wants to keep or give away that lifting and potting them up fell by the wayside in the wet winter. Last month we were motivated to think again after an inspiring talk on low maintenance gardening by Professor Sandy Primrose at the KEHS monthly meeting. His talk was brim-full of ideas and illustrations from his own splendid garden in High Wycombe. Gardening is very much a work in progress, it is never complete and over the years our garden, like those of so many other keen gardeners, has evolved not just from new ideas and inspiration but with our ability to manage and enjoy it.

BBC Singer – Alice Gribbin

Things changed in 2017 when I was appointed as a member of the BBC Singers.

My husband Ben and I have lived in the old Rectory on the corner of Springs Lane for 11 years. We have two teenage sons and two cats, and Ben's mum Deborah lives next door. She can often be found selling incredible cakes in the church on a summery Sunday afternoon! Ben is an opera singer who performs in opera houses across the world.

I have been a professional choral singer since I left university 23 years ago. It's an unusual career, which takes some explaining in the hairdresser's chair, but one that I love.

Like most choral singers, I spent the first 15 years of my career freelancing, and during that time I sang for most of the UK's professional choirs. Over the years I have performed across the world. I have recorded soundtracks for Hollywood blockbusters and Christmas TV ads, and sung in concert halls, cathedrals and churches, and once even a potato shed!

Things changed in 2017 when I was appointed as a member of the BBC Singers. The BBC's radio choir is the only chamber choir in the UK which employs singers on a full-time basis. There are 18 positions, but 21 singers as some (including me!) work on a job-share basis. Each morning I board the 08.55 from Wendover to Marylebone, from where I walk to the famous BBC Maida Vale studios. It's an exciting place to work. I love passing by studio 1, listening to the rehearsals of the BBC Symphony Orchestra. Meanwhile, further down the corridor, you find the rock, pop and jazz musicians, and over the years I have bumped into the likes of Dua Lipa, Morrisey, Michael Bublé and The Pet Shop Boys.

We work primarily for the BBC's classical music station, Radio 3.

Unlike most choirs which are conducted by the same person, we work with dozens of different conductors, so no two weeks are the same. Often, we record music which Radio 3 has requested, either for a specific programme, or to mark an occasion (eq Christmas or International Women's Day). These recordings are usually done live in a concert setting, with an audience, but sometimes we record in private sessions in our studio. Our remit also stretches beyond Radio 3. Over the last year we have recorded backing vocals for Strictly Come Dancing, voiced a choir small furry creatures in two episodes of Hey Duggee for CBeebies, and featured in a BBC2 documentary with Gareth Malone.

Certain engagements appear without fail each year. We always perform at the first and last nights of the BBC Proms in the Royal Albert Hall, as well as at some of the other Proms in between. The BBC Proms is the world's biggest classical music festival, stretching across 8 weeks of the summer each year, with several concerts per day, all of which are broadcast on Radio 3, and some of which are also on the television. It's always a thrill to be part of the Last Night of the Proms, which feels like a huge party! We even managed to perform during the pandemic in 2020. The Proms lasted for only two weeks, with no live audiences, but all broadcast live. On the Last Night we sang from the stalls in the Royal Albert Hall, distanced from one another at two metres on all sides, with only our BBC Symphony Orchestra colleagues for company in that vast space. It was an incredibly moving evening, and we felt deeply honoured to be singing when so many could not.


The variety of music is both challenging and rewarding. One size does not fit all in classical music, and you cannot approach a piece of Renaissance church music with the same vocal colours as you might approach an opera aria or a song from a Broadway musical. Most singers have an area of music where they excel, so you may specialise in singing "early" music from the Renaissance period, or you may find that your voice is more suited Romantic music from the 19th Century.

To be a BBC Singer means to have a willingness to turn your voice to all of it! Every Monday morning I arrive at work to a new set of pieces on my stand. Last week, for example, we recorded a new commission celebrating a century of radio broadcast, which took its inspiration from the "pips" on Radio 4. The week before that I performed some chant by Hildegard of Bingen, a nun who was composing music in the eleventh century. Vocally this means that you've got to be adaptable, fit and agile, and the same goes for your brain because of the sheer weight of learning each week.

For a while in 2023 the future of the group looked very uncertain, but happily things are now looking much rosier, and we are planning big celebrations for the group's centenary, which takes place this autumn.

I'm very fortunate to have been able to make a living from something which I love so much. It can feel hard work in mid-December when you're drowning in carols and have a streaming cold, but I still love it!

Butlers Cross to Lviv, Ukraine – *April 24*



Pickups for Peace – Ukrainian Humanitarian Relief Charity

In February 2023, a group of Scottish based farmers, took the initiative to set up a charity supplying pick-up trucks, laden with humanitarian aid direct to Ukraine. They have now organised almost 400 vehicles and most of them end up on the front line as quick response vehicles helping save lives.

Being the owner of an under used 15 year old Mitsubishi L200 pick up, it occurred to me that my trusty vehicle could be put to better use than the odd trip to the dump and Wendover Woods with the dog!

Working with Pickups for Peace, I booked myself onto their next convoy. After some very generous donations from friends, neighbours. clients and a local builders merchant, I had a truck full of heavy duty rescue tools, jerry cans, technical saviour stretchers, leg splints, haemorrhage trauma kits and tourniquets.

Along with my co-driver, we departed Butlers Cross at 6am on 24th April 2024 and 3 days later, we reached the border of Poland / Ukraine. Remarkably, with the average journey distance of 1500 miles, the full convoy of 37 vehicles from all over Britain converged within 30 minutes of one another at the Polish rendezvous point. Especially impressive, given the average age of vehicle was 15 years old with 140,000 miles on the clock!

The transit through the border took several hours, as the vehicles were

all scrutinised and legal ownership was transferred to the Ukrainian Government. Under Ukrainian Police escort, we then drove the last 80 miles in a "do not stop" police convoy into central into Lviv.

On the morning of 27th April 24, I said goodbye to the truck I had owned for 6 years and we were thanked by the Mayor of Lviv and Ukrainian Army for the support that the British people are giving the people of Ukraine. They described their relationship with British people as a "close and special relationship".

At this point, it really struck me how important these initiatives are for the morale of soldiers and residents in the Eastern parts of Ukraine. Other than a nighttime curfew and some building defences Lviv is a beautiful City, which you could be forgiven for thinking it was not part of a country at war. We were then personally introduced to some Soldiers, an Army Colonel, an Orphanage Director, local Politicians and a University Professor. My impression of the City was soon very different. This is a City which is deeply affected by the war.

The most brutal evidence was a city greenspace, we visited. We were taken on a small bus and as we turned the corner into the entrance of the former park, the bus went silent. In the past 18 months, it has been turned into new military cemetery. The day I visited 5 new graves had been prepared, but there were over 1000 recent graves and being a Saturday many were being attended by grieving loved ones.

Every truck donated is estimated to save at least 3 lives on the front line, but unfortunately these vehicles only have a life expectancy of 2 weeks on the front line.

The Charity is Pickups For Peace. There is also a Just Giving page if you would like to show your support, or perhaps with convoys being organised every 8 weeks, you may even want to take a truck over yourself?








Art at the church


















'Tis the Season: *Bluebells, Sunshine and Cream Teas*



The Muir Trust and Discover Bucks Museum are delighted to announce that Belfast artist, Cara Gordon, is this year's artist-in residence at the Museum from 9 April ~

Cara's evocative works range from portraiture to landscapes. She is a renowned and award-winning artist including winning the RUA Gold Medal at the 2021 exhibition at the Ulster Museum.

For her Residency, Cara will create a group of drawn portraits and sketches of local people within the museum and the surrounding town. These may be quick spontaneous sketches or longer studies made onto collages of discarded papers that add another dimension and texture to each portrait. She will be looking for a diverse range of sitters to illustrate the town and its communities today and hopes to engage new audiences with her work. Mel Czapski, Curator of Art at Discover Bucks Museum, said, "Portraits are a fascinating subject, giving a unique insight into the sitter. Cara's experimentation with process and materials, building up layers of collage beneath the portrait adds an extra dimension to her work. This residency is a fabulous opportunity for our visitors to engage with a professional artist and explore their own creativity through our workshops."

Cara welcomes visitors to her studio in the museum on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays and will also be sketching portraits in Aylesbury Library on Tuesdays. If you've always wanted to try portraiture, come along to Cara's exciting workshop day for adults on collage and charcoal portraits on Saturday 20 April. Finally, you can hear Cara talk about her residency and see her residency exhibition on the afternoon of Thursday 23 May.



Village Summer Party – Saturday 29th June

The Parish Village Party is taking place at the Parish Hall on Saturday 29th June from 12.30pm to 5pm.

The day is an "all welcome" event for Parishioners to meet and sample some local produce and catch up with friends and neighbours. It will include Buckmoorend Farm meats on the BBQ, Chiltern Brewery's finest ales, a local honey producer demonstration and activities, the Ellesborough Silver Band, a Church cake stall and the judging of the Childrens Garden Design competition.

Parish Hall Playground

As mentioned in my last note, the playground failed its Health and Safety audit and needed substantial capital expenditure to get it back fully operational. The efforts of Cllr Holman can now be seen and the children are enjoying the improved speed of the refurbished roundabout ! Thank you again, to all the sponsors who financially supported this popular village amenity.

A common topic, in the Public Forum at Parish Council meetings is the poor state of our road surfaces, which appear to have been deteriorating more often and taking longer to repair. The instinct is that this is in part due to HS2 traffic rerouting and more commercial vehicle movements. EPC meet on a monthly basis with HS2 and Bucks Highways to lobby for improvements and repairs to our roads, but the above link is the best way to initially raise any issues and we would encourage all Parishioners to keep reporting via this link, in the first instance.

Road Safety

The new solar powered mobile speed cameras have now arrived and will be installed shortly. There are 9 locations across the Parish where the cameras will periodically rotated. Speeding data will be captured and sent directly to Thames Valley Police, and this will provide a valuable in tool in targeting long term speed reduction in our village. Ellesborough Parish are now at the forefront of using technology to tackle speed awareness and this replaces our original cameras which were acquired 10 years ago.

Affordable Housing

A resolution to grant planning consent was approved by Bucks Council (BC) in July 2023 to build 6 x 2 bedroom houses on a site in Chalkshire Road. The decision was approved, subject to a legal agreement being put in place, between the land owner, the developer and BC. This agreement is intended to give occupational priority to people with established local links to Ellesborough Parish, in perpetuity. This was also the express basis upon which EPC supported the application for affordable housing and we were consulted on the acceptable terms of this proposed agreement. It remains a matter of frustration that 9 months on, BC are still unable to agree the terms of this legal agreement with the Affordable Housing provider to enable the development to commence. It is now unlikely any construction works will commence before Autumn.

Hopefully the sun is out and I see you all on the 29th June.

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
